TWENTY THIRD ANNUAL REPORT.

May it please your Grace,

The Managers of St. Brigid's Orphanage and Schools of the Holy Faith beg to submit to your Grace, the Clergy, and the Catholic Public, this their Twenty-Third Annual Report.

Twenty-two years ago a very remarkable fact happened in reference to the Orphanage. The old Parish Vestries of Dublin, which used to take up poor children and rear them Protestants, at the expense of the citizens of Dublin, had been deprived, some time previously of the right of levying taxes for this purpose. The only resource then was to put these children into the poorhouse. But to secure their perversion, the opinion of the then Law Adviser to the Castle was procured, to the effect that all children, the religion of whose parents was unknown, should, on entering the poorhouse, be registered Protestants.

It was hard in those times to find Protestant nurses for all the infants, and thirty-seven of them were left with Catholics during infancy But these poor Catholics, being unable to support them with out payment, reluctantly brought the infants into Dublin, to place them in the poorhouse. They were persuaded, however, to return to the country, pending some negociations set on foot to save the children's faith, for the good people had got them baptized. Nothing, however, was done, and a second time the children were brought into town to be put into the poorhouse as Protestants St. Brigid's Orphanage was, at this time, in its infancy, without funds, character, or credit, still willing to take charge of the thirty seven children. But the nurses knew not St. Brigid s, and how could they trust that payment would be forthcoming from the Orphanage. In this difficulty, the Parish Priest of St. Nicholas, Francis Street, stood in the gap and saved the children. He sent for the country people, who were having some refreshment in the inns about Francis Street after their long journey, before bringing the Children to the poorhouse, pledged his word that St. Brigid would not fail to pay them every half year, and induced them to return home with their charge. The Priest's word was kept, the Orphanage did not fail to pay, and all these children were reared Catholics. The Parish Priest of St. Nicholas was then the Very Rev Canon M'Cabe, who has ever since been the friend of the Orphanage, and whom the good Providence of God has now set in the See of St. Laurence to continue the work of the late illustrious Cardinal Archbishop in protecting the Faith of the Orphans and destitute children of our Catholic poor

St. Brigid's Orphanage has now been in existence

twenty-three years. The first child was admitted early in the year 1857 From that time to the end of 1879, one thousand five hundred and twenty Orphans, boys and girls, have been received. Of these, one THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED AND FIFTY have been reared, educated, and put on their own account to maintain themselves by their own ex ertions, and we are happy to be able to report that, with scarcely half-a-dozen exceptions, they have succeeded. They had been all reared in the country with honest and religious families, where they had been trained to make themselves useful about the house and the land almost from infancy Hence, the work of trade or service was natural to them. Three HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-FIVE of these Orphans were adopted by the families in which they had been nursed, and thus escaped many of the dangers of the world. Those who were put to trades or service had been accustomed more by the example than the advice of their foster-parents to receive the sacra ments monthly, and this good habit they have retained with wonderful fidelity in their several positions in life. This is, we think, the main cause why so many have succeeded in earning an honest livelihood.

The year 1879 has been a year of calamity and distress, and the Orphanage has, to some extent, shared in the general depression. Not having any fixed revenue or foundation, and depending on voluntary contributions, the Managers were obliged reluctantly to refuse many applications for the admission of Orphans, whom it would certainly have been a great mercy to receive. But on the other hand, it was absolutely necessary to meet current habilities, lest the whole work should collapse.

On this account, the number of Orphans received last year has been smaller than that of many former years—viz: eighteen. These, however, were cases of pressing necessity, where it seemed that the faith of the children could not be otherwise saved.

The health of the Orphans has been always good. There were two hundred and sixty-three Children in the Orphange last year, and of these only three died. In many former years the deaths had been even less. This is the more extraordinary from the fact that many mere infants have been admitted, and that there has been no health-test, the only questions being those of danger of loss of faith and destitution, and, in fact, several sick children have been admitted, and others quite worn and wasted.

The Schooling of the Orphans has been better during the past year, and this improvement arises chiefly from the system of payment by results in the National Schools. The most stringent measures were always taken to secure sufficient schooling for the Orphans, but not with all the success we desired. Now, however, the income of the Teacher depends, to a considerable extent, upon the improvement of the pupil, and as poor Orphan Children are often rich in brains, and therefore capable of being turned to account in a results point of view, their schooling is often well attended to.

We are anxious to afford shelter to every poor Catholic Orphan and destitute Child that is really in danger of losing the Faith. All we want is more ample means. And, in fact, there never was a time since the famine of 1847, in which the Orphanage required more abundant help to carry on its work, than at present. The seasons of distress

have been always the opportunities of the Proselytisers It was so in 1821 25, when Lord Farnham and his cooperators and agents offered bread and bacon to starving Catholics, to induce them to renounce their faith, and some who accepted this bribe, expecting to return after the distress, never got the grace to do so, and lost their Faith. It was so in 1846-48, when soup was given as the price of apostacy. The poor Irish Catholic has no leaning to heresy, nay, he has a strong aversion to it, and hence, with scarcely an ex ception, it was only under the pressure of dire distress, and in the agony of hunger pangs, that Catholics have given up their Children to the Proselytisers. But the present is more fraught with danger than former periods of want, for this reason, that the machinery set up in 47 for entrapping poor Catholics is still in working order. In former periods of Irish history, the attempts at proselytism were sudden outbursts of fanaticism, that only lasted a few years at most. Now it is an elaborated system, an almost perfect organization, with intelligent agents, who eat of its bread, and are nursed in its bosom, and with large and pretty steady revenues. The opposition therefore to this wicked system of proselytism must be strong, steady, and perseverant. We must act like Ferdinand and Isabella of Spain in their war with the Mahomedan Moors, who, when they could not take the city of Grenada by storm or by ordinary siege, built beside it the city of Santa Fé (of the Holy Faith), and there sat down, determined if necessary to carry on the siege for generations, and thus obtained a great and final victory

We have to thank Almighty God for all the favours bestowed on the Orphanage during the past

year And, indeed, it is a great blessing that amid almost national ruin, we have been enabled to keep St. Brigid s Orphans in the Institution, and continue their education without incurring debt. We beg all the subscribers, but especially the Archbishops, Bishops, and Clergy, to accept our heartfelt thanks, for they subscribed while their own subjects were in dire distress, judging doubtless that the claim of poor children in danger of loss of Faith was supreme. The Brothers of the Guilds are entitled not only to our thanks, but to the gratitude of the Catholic Church, for their long, constant, and arduous labours in defence of the Faith. They have brought to the Orphans Fund the pence of the poor, and therewith the blessing of God. In former years the Orphanage received great help from a Guild of Ladies, but deaths, vocations to religion, and other causes have deprived us of their cooperation. We wish very much to reestablish the Guild, and invite all who wish to secure for themselves the Aureola promised to those who defend the faith, to come and devote a little of their time to the Orphanage.

St. Brigid's is capable of succouring an unlimited number of Orphans. The Managers are willing, as heretofore, to give their time and labour gratuitously Catholic Orphans and destitute children are falling every day, and before our eyes, into the hands of those who rob them of that Faith without which no one ever did, or ever shall enter Heaven. The one thing wanted is the means to support and educate them. Reader, will you let these innocent children be lost, and lost eternally?

SCHOOLS OF THE HOLY FAITH.

We have more than once stated in former Reports that these Schools were auxiliaries to the Orphanage, in as much as they were founded, to receive the Children of the poor, who had been tempted to go to Protestant and Proselytising day Schools. The Schools of the Holy Faith are purely Catholic Schools, being subject only to ecclesiastical authority We have to report an addition of two to the number of Schools, and an increase of pupils in those previously established. There are now, more than two thousand Children attending the Schools of the Holy Faith. It is scarcely necessary to add that religious and moral teaching holds the first place in these Schools, and that the secular teaching is leavened with the religious. In the face of so much heretical and infidel teaching, with such a flood of anti-religions, and immoral literature, reach ing by its cheapness the lowest stratum of society, every good Catholic must feel that there is the greatest need of religious and moral training in the Schools. But, unfortunately, when it was most necessary to supply motives and incentives to Teachers to attend well to the religious instruction of their pupils, the very opposite has been done. In the national and intermediate systems of education the Catechism is thrown out, so that it is impossible for the Teacher or the college to obtain one penny of results fees for the Catechism. What will be the consequence? It is not in human nature to bestow as much time and labour upon that which is unpaid and unprized, as upon that which will bring money and renown. Besides, in the keen competition, and

as one may say, breathless scramble now going on for honours and prizes in education, it is hard to expect that time will be taken from the secular, which alone can win, to spend upon religious instruction, which counts for nothing in the race. But the worst consequence to be apprehended is, that the children, in process of time may come to contemn that which is accounted by those over them, as apparently unworthy of study, or attention And this is precisely what has begun to happen in the primary Schools for Catholics in England. For a considerable time past, the Teacher in a Catholic School in England can earn nothing from the state, by the teaching of the Catechism, while he is handsomely rewarded for success in secular branches. The effect of all this has been, as some priests from English Missions have told us, that the children look upon the Catechism as beneath their attention, and cannot endure being questioned in it. We need not expect any legal redress of this great grievance, for the tendency of legislation is towards secularism and not towards religion, as is manifest from the late Board School enactment. Many things may of course, be done to lessen the tendency to secularism in the Schools of Catholics, or even perhaps to neutralize that tendency, but the direct clear way to secure a Catholic education for Catholic children is to establish Schools in which the Catechism shall hold the first place, and religious and moral duties be inculcated before, and above everything else. This is the one thing necessary, for all learning and all knowledge will profit him nothing, who has not learned well to observe the law of God.

In the hope that these lines may meet the eye of some charitable person we name in particular the

West Park Street Schools, where five hundred of the poorest children of the Liberties are educated. They are so poor that most of them have been unable to buy books, or other School requisites, nay, not a few have been living almost exclusively on the food they receive in the Schools, and are clothed almost entirely in the articles of dress given there, while at the same time, strong temptations of material help are held out to them by the rich Proselytising Schools before their door. We have continued to give the food, and even increased the quantity latterly, but the state of our funds for the last nine months did not permit us to give any clothing.

In conclusion, we commit all these dear children to Almighty God, humbly beseeching Him to watch over and confirm them in the faith, to assist with His holy grace, those charged with their education, that they may bring them up in the fear and love of God, and the observance of His holy law, to raise up friends for those who are still in danger of losing the faith, and to protect with His mighty arm, this poor Ireland, so that in all her losses she may not have to deplore the spiritual and eternal loss of any of St. Patrick's children.

On last Christmas Day, Three hundred and seventy persons have had from this Institution a good meat dinner, with vegetables.

TESTAMENTARY GUARDIANS.

Extract from a Pamphlet published by his Lordship the Bishop of Southwark, and kindly presented by him to St. Brigid's Orphanage.

PRACTICAL SUGGESTIONS AND DIRECTIONS AS TO APPOINTING TESTAMENTARY GUARDIANS.

No particular form of words is necessary for the appointment of a testamentary guardian, nor is any legal assistance necessary The following would be sufficient: "I, A. B., &c., by this my " of "Will or Codicil) appoint C D., of &c.,] to be the Guardian " [and E F., of "[or guardians] of my children after my decease, and I "direct that my children shall be brought up in the Roman "Catholic Faith, which I profess." A Testamentary Guardian may be appointed by any Will or Codicil, whether containing any disposition of property or not, and whether the father has any property to leave or not. It must, like any other Will, be signed (or marked in lieu of a signature by the father in the presence of two witnesses, who must sign their names as attesting witnesses in the presence of the father and of each other A Will or Codicil appointing guardians can be revoked at any time by being destroyed by the father with that intent, or by his executing a subsequent Will or Codicil. It need not be proved after his decease unless it also disposes of personal property or appoints Executors; and even if it ought to be proved, it is effectual, and can be acted on, as regards the guardianship, although it has not been proved. The guardians may be of either sex, and one will be sufficient, though it will be better to name more, to provide against death or refusal to act. The Guardians need not be also appointed Executors or Trustees, and need not have any control over the infant's property given to them. Persons residing, or who are likely to reside out of England and Wales, (or out of Ireland, if that is the residence of the children), should if possible, not be appointed. Married women may be appointed guardians, but in considering of the propriety of appointing married women, or women likely to marry it must be borne in mind that the powers of Guardian ship given to them will mainly be dependent on their husbands. The Court of Chancery (in cases where it interferes as above explained) will consider that on a female guardian marrying, her powers as a guardian came to an end, and it will consider whether, taking into account the character and position of her husband, it will be beneficial for the children to re-appoint her.

Note by Mr. Bagshawe.—I have considered the above suggestions, and in my opinion they are an accurate statement of the English Law on the subject to which they relate.

FORM OF BEQUEST TO ST BRIGID'S ORPHANAGE.

"I give and bequeath the sum of unto the treasurer for the time being of St. Brigid's Orphanage, Eccles Street, Dublin: the same to be paid within months next after my decease, and applied to the uses and purposes of said Orphanage; and for which the receipt of such Treasurer shall be a sufficient discharge."

Note.—It should be particularly noticed, that no Will whatsoever, whether of real or personal property which bears date after the first day of January, 1838, is valid unless it be signed at the foot by the Testator, or by some person in his presence, and by his direction, and said signature acknowledged by him in the presence of two witnesses, who shall sign the same as witnesses in the presence of the Testator, and in the presence of each other.
